





## GREETINGS FROM BISHOP-ELECT MICHAEL

Warmest greetings from Kilkenny, where I will continue to be based for some more weeks until my translation to the 'new' diocese of Tuam, Limerick and Killaloe takes effect on April 14, three months after my election in lanuary.

While leaving my present context after 16 fascinating years is inevitably a wrench, I am realising that there is indeed a certain rightness about the timing and the task, and I am genuinely looking forward with relish the miseries of house moving apart - to a new chapter in my episcopal ministry. This greeting is not a proper Bishop's Letter, for you will receive plenty of them from me in times to come, but simply a request for your prayers and understanding as I make this transition and learn of the life of the Church in such an extraordinary variety of settings in the West and mid-West. I hope I can make some small contribution to helping the 'new' diocese gel together with both confidence and joy, and I also look forward to spending a significant amount of my time in actual residence in Co. Mayo, once the final details of the Michael Cashel Ferns & Ossory arrangements for the episcopal abode there are

sorted out. From afar, I have admired the courage, realism and vision of both TKA and L&K in themselves seeking out this new configuration, and I will be privileged to play a small part in diocesan history by being the first bishop of these newly United Dioceses.

In my sixteen years in the House of Bishops I have sat at the table with Bishops Neill, Henderson, Rooke, Mayes, Williams and Kearon so I have had some opportunity to absorb from them insights concerning their contexts and priorities. At present I am conscious of the burden of responsibility that continues to fall upon the Commissaries, particularly in the West Archdeacon McWhirter. I will continue to be highly grateful to them as I find my feet, and I look forward hugely to meeting you all around the parishes

Again, greetings from the South East - and soon I will have to practice writing my name differently!

## ABOUT BISHOP-ELECT MICHAEL


Bishop-elect Michael will be translated from the United Dioceses of Cashel, Ferns and Ossory to the United Dioceses of Tuam. Limerick and Killaloe on Maundy Thursday, 14th April. Below a little information about him:

The Right Reverend Michael Burrows (born 1961) was ordained in 1987 after graduating from Trinity College Dublin. He initially served as Curate of Douglas with Frankfield, in the Diocese of Cork, Cloyne and Ross (1987-1991). He was subsequently Chaplain of Trinity College Dublin (1991-1994), during which time he was also a Lecturer in Church History and Liturgy at the Church of Ireland Theological College. He returned to Cork, Cloyne and Ross as Rector of

Bandon (1994-2002) before becoming Dean of Cork and Incumbent of St Fin Barre's (2002–2006).

He was elected Bishop of Cashel, Ferns and Ossory in March 2006 and consecrated as bishop in Christ Church Cathedral, Dublin, in July of that year. Bishop Burrows is Chair of the Church of Ireland's Commission for Christian Unity and Dialogue, Chair of the Board of Governors of the Anglican Centre in Rome, Co-Chair of the Church of Ireland-Methodist Covenant Council, and Patron of the Irish Guild of the Church (Cumann Gaelach na hEaglaise). He is married to Claire with four grown-up children, Henry, Andrew, Grainne and James, and is a keen railway enthusiast and organist.



## MID-WEEK ACTIVE RETIREMENT BREAKS



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#### **CHURCH ARMY**

'What motivated Wilson Carlile?'
2022 marks the 140th anniversary of the founding of Church Army. Who was its founder and what motivated him to take the steps he took?

Wilson Carlile was a man who lived an interesting and colourful life. Prior to becoming a Christian, he was a successful businessman, importing cloth from Europe, where he spent much time travelling on the continent. This was not a risk-free adventure, as the Franco-Prussian war was raging during his travels and the sights that he witnessed left an impression on him. He had 'seen men march out, in all the glory of health ... to be mangled and killed.' This led him to search for some philosophy of assurance as to the meaning of life ... something to make sense of the pain and

destruction, which he has witnessed. He read philosophers, such as Kant, Descartes and Nietzsche. All was going well for him, until in 1873 his business was almost wiped out by crashes on the stock markets, reducing his personal wealth by 95%. This left him in a dark depressive state of mind: he had worked for many years to grow his business and it had almost been the sole focus of his energies. His aunt had written to him for years trying to persuade him of the value of Christianity and of his need for Jesus, but until now he had roundly rejected her assertion. Now, when he had lost all he had worked for, he saw how his energy had been misplaced, and became convinced








that he must give his life to Jesus, and work for the rest of his days for him.

Wilson began to work almost immediately to bring others to faith, engaging in evangelism, youth work, service of others, and eventually came to the conclusion he was being called to ordained ministry. This early passion for evangelism returned during his curacy in Kensington (an area which included significant deprivation at the time), and with the



blessing of his Vicar he started working to reach out to those with no interest in faith, religion, or spirituality. Out of this work Church Army was founded in 1882. It wasn't long after its founding, 1883 in fact, that Carlile began to formally recruit, train, and send out evangelists to work in the Church of England. He recognised the need in the wider Church for those passionate to share their faith to be suitably equipped to do so. The foundations he laid of evangelism, service to those on the margins, and of bringing the love of God to those who don't know it, are still the foundations of Church Army today, and can be seen in our mission statement:

We want everyone everywhere to encounter God's love and be empowered to transform their communities through faith shared in words and action. (Written by Jonny Price, published by Church Army and used by permission).

What we really want to be known for is how we walk alongside and love those who are struggling, especially the marginalised. Our continuing pastoral care work in Ballina involves connecting with people who struggle with loneliness and isolation. Others have to deal with debilitating physical and mental illnesses on a daily basis. We support women who experience domestic violence. We visit those living alone. We also connect with people every day on the streets of Ballina. Some of these people battle with alcoholism, drug addictions and have criminal records. Recently, we also received a request for a Life Application Bible from an inmate in prison. Charles Wesley's hymn is one of my favourites:

'Long my imprisoned spirit
Fast bound in sin and nature's night;

Thine eye diffused a quick'ning ray, I woke, the dungeon flamed with light; My chains fell off, my heart was free; I rose, went forth and followed Thee.

Amazing Love! How can it be That Thou, my God, shouldst die for me!

God's mercy is available to all, even 'the least of these' (Matthew 25 vs 44-45).

#### **CHRISTMAS TIME**

At Christmastime, we distributed 'Good News' gift bags to 40 families in the community. Thanks to generous donations, we were also able to give Bibles to adults and gift bags to the elderly and their 'carers'. We also had an 'impromptu' Carol Service in one of the housing estates, which was attended by volunteers and local families. As we enjoyed a long spell of fine weather, we were also able to do 'Chalk Art' at St. Muredach's Cathedral. Two artistic teenage girls, who



attend Gortner Abbey in Crossmolina, joined in. It was their first time participating, and together, we hope to plan new artistic projects for 2022.

#### **BIBLE STUDY**



In January, we began a new Bible Study series in 'Discipleship'. Using a method called Discovery Bible Studies, we read the Bible passage several times and then ask people to retell the story in their own words. Once people are happy with the story, we discuss the following questions:

What does this teach me about God?
What does this teach us about people (about me)?
Why did God write this?
If this is God's word for my life ... how will I obey it?
What does God want me to do?
Who am I going to tell?

Every Sunday evening, we meet on-line to pray for the



## COMMISSIONING of CHURCH ARMY EVANGELISTS

On Monday 22nd November 2021, Marian Edwards and Matt Gould were both Commissioned as Church Army Evangelists and admitted into the Office of Evangelist in Sheffield. The service was led by the Archbishop of York, the Rt. Hon. Stephen Cottrell and Ven. Peter Rouch, CEO of Church Army.





Matt Gould was appointed as Lead Evangelist and community leader at the Carraig Centre in Ballincollig. This appointment is part of the Partnership between Church Army, the Diocese of Cork Cloyne and Ross and the Carraig Centre/Carrigrohane Union of Parishes.



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## ST PATRICK'S IN KILLALA

The Cathedral Church of St Patrick, Killala, which is within. By the royal visitation in 1615 the cathedral not only one of Ireland's smallest cathedrals but also one of its oldest is situated on the west side of Killala Bay. The Episcopal See of Killala is said to have been founded between 434 and 441 by St Patrick himself. According to one tradition Patrick is said to have worked as a slave in the hills around Killala and here developed his love of the country, its people and its language. When he returned as a missionary to Ireland he is said to have landed close to Foclut (Foghill), near Killala.


Following the founding of the See here by St Patrick a monastic settlement grew and by medieval times Killala was a town, one of the oldest in the west of Ireland.

There has been a church on the site for centuries, evidenced by the 9th century souterrain in the graveyard which has several chambers contained


was recorded as a ruin, which led to the current cathedral being built in 1670. The tower and spire were added in 1817 and a restoration carried out in the 1990s. The building is in the gothic style and has interior stone walls, box pews, and a gallery which houses a rare Telford organ, dating from 1838.

## OLD SCHOOL



My eldest daughter Harvest, keeps telling me 'Dad get with it, you're so old school!' I'm choosing to take that as a compliment, I like being old school and I suppose I am. My desk phone is the first phone my grandmother had from the

1950's, I'll only shoot side by side and my personal preference is for Form One worship!

While I have a smart phone and use it every day, I'm not fussed on it; I'd prefer not to have one at all, I now mostly leave it in the car when I'm visiting or at a meeting. I've come to resent the constant buzzing in my pocket and the mild anxiety with not being able to answer or see who it is. If my daughter says I'm old school, my long-suffering wife says I'm a 'Luddite'. Until last year I simply refused to engage in social media, how I used to smile when she got irate because people tried to contact me through her Facebook! Although that all changed with the Covid-19 situation, I'm relieved I've now dropped back off the edge. My Facebook account was hacked and I was only too happy to let it go.

I never got past social contact being over the airwaves in the late 70's and early 80's with Citizen's Band Radios (CB's)! I can remember sitting in dad's car for hours talking to people throughout Bangor, and sometimes further afield when the skip was good. In the days of old glory these rigs were illegal sets brought in from the USA using the old 27 MHz. We used the lingo and handles made famous in popular culture through the great movies of the time such as 'Convoy' (Kris Kristofferson 1978) and 'Smokey and the Bandit' (Burt Reynolds 1977). Who could resist passing information driver-to-driver and getting one over Dirty Lyle (Ernest Borgnine) the crooked cop. I'm still at it!

In both cars Jen and I have modern CB's. Here in the West of Ireland you'll all be familiar with, and suffer from, local black spots with no mobile signal coverage; doesn't bother us! When Jen and I have to travel in the same direction in two cars, which can be quite often, we switch from mobile phone to CB. Holding a mic is still the only legal way to communicate while driving. In the old days Channel 19 was used to make a copy, we choose to use Chanel 22 and apart from us the air waves are completely silent. We do see others with antennas on the car roof, but most of those guys are

fairly heavy duty using both the regulated and free bands of the amateur (ham) radio frequencies! Have a look at just how many cars with an extra antenna you see, there's always a few round Achill! However when I wanted one I was able to get a rig from a guy, there's always a guy, an old enthusiast from the day so I was able to buy a radio here in Ballina!

When we are fortunate enough to hear others on the air waves most guys just chat now, but I'm a purist still using handles and the ten codes. Our handles are Sam Eagle, Long Tall Sally and Belfast Bap; I'll leave it to you to work out who's who, and, yes, even Kizzy can make a

Staying connected is a necessity in the 21st Century, as I've said I often find being constantly contactable tiresome and the expectation of so many people is an immediate response. Communication on the airwaves is relaxed, easy and Fun with a capital 'F'. There's no licence fee, no connection charge and no pay as you go or monthly bills. You buy a radio and you're connected for free for the rest of your life. You don't even need to be mobile you can have a rig set up as a base station in the

As I think of our small community of the Church of Ireland and the importance of staying connected and looking out for each other in isolated, rural communities I think the airwaves of CB radio as an underused and wasted resource. As I visit round my own parishes and further throughout the diocese I acknowledge one of the biggest problems for many people in this modern age are feelings of loneliness and isolation, which is hugely ironic in a world that is entirely connected. I dream of the old days and wonder how much fun it would be if we had radios, arranging meetings in car parks (eyeballs) for gathering socially at the weekends. Hearing each other on the airwaves and knowing we had something in common. It's a great way to stay connected, to pass on information and news and you can listen in just for the craic. Can you imagine driving along minding your own business and getting a call from the 'Big B' when he arrives!

This is Sam Eagle saying 10 - 10 till we do it again! Over and out.



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

#### **Happy New Year!**

May I begin by thanking all the clergy who have helped, and continue to help with the services in both Tubbercurry and Rathbarron during this time of vacancy. A vacancy inspection was carried out by the Rural Dean and the Archdeacon on the 22nd November, which included the formal handover from the previous incumbent, the Rev. 

Bishop Patrick has retired and we have not been able to have a service since because of the pandemic and when restrictions lifted a little I could not get the large conference hall for our service as it was used for breakfasts to ensure social distancing, and the other rooms were too small. #### GENERAL

#### The Dean Writes:

The lifting of most of the Covid restrictions in January was a most welcome and long awaited thing. At the time of writing the only limiting restriction which

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remains for us is basically the wearing of masks in church. God willing and with a good following wind, this too may be gone by the time you read these notes.

With that in mind, and in hopeful anticipation of no more bumps in the road, I want to turn our thoughts to re-establishing the reception of wine at the Holy Communion.

I haven't quite decided how best to do this. However, I understand that folk are still nervous, and will be for some time to come, so it seems sensible to very reluctantly rule out the Common Cup for the foreseeable future and to offer individual small portions of consecrated wine to those who wish to receive it at the time of the communion. In many ways this is foreign to our Anglican understanding and doctrine of what 'Communion' means......Communion both with God and with each other. However, we cannot continue forever in offering the sacrament in one kind only.

To that end I see the intention of the use of individual cups as being a necessary and circumstance-driven provision. Further, it is my intention to engage in this practise only for so long as it is absolutely required so that we can receive in both kinds. I do not like it, but I like even less communion with consecrated bread only. So this will be a lesser of two evils.

I will let you know the practical side of how this will be done in due course.

#### A note from Roundstone

The burial of Francis Ashe took place in Roundstone on 25th November. Due to shortage of space, he was buried in the grave of his great-grandfather, Canon James McCormick DD, who was rector here for forty years and built the tower, chancel, porch and rectory.

Francis, or 'Flash', as he was known, was a great supporter of the village, particularly the regatta, where his generous appearance money, donated to visiting sailors, soon found its way into local pubs. He leaves two sons, Nicholas, and Simon who lives in Clifden.

The pointing of the west wall has been temporarily suspended and the scaffold removed to facilitate a wedding, but will resume shortly. For the first time a lightening conductor has been installed on the tower. The Catholic church in Roundstone was struck by lightning a few years ago, and considerable repair work required, so it was felt that St Mary's tower, which is higher, should be protected, although it had survived unscathed for over a century.


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
