THE BISHOP WRITES

Dear Friends

It is quite a delight to be writing a single letter for a joint issue of Newslink and Tidings, and to thank the editorial teams of both publications for this initiative. It is part of a testing of the waters as to how, over time, our two diocesan magazines might perhaps appropriately converge into a single publication which could assist our now united diocesan family to feel truly one, its members mutually interdependent and well informed in prayer and conversation concerning the activities and needs of one another, from Tubbercurry to Kenmare and from Birr to Clifden.

So this is a good time to review some of the developments in life and ministry around our single family. And happily there is much to say.

We have three Institutions in the coming weeks. On Saturday, June 24 (the Feast of the Birth of St John the Baptist) at 1530 the Revd Keith Barry will be instituted in Nenagh. He comes to the shores of Lough Derg after a long effective ministry particularly in military chaplaincy in the context of the British armed forces. However, his home place is Kinsale in Co Cork and he is delighted to be returning to parochial ministry in his native land.

Then on Friday July 7 at 1930 the Revd Suzanne Cousins will be instituted in Westport. She comes to us from ministry in Benburb, Co Tyrone, but has an earlier professional background in teaching and has lived and worked in Down, Dublin and Donegal as well as for a time in South Africa. She has served the wider Church of Ireland most notably in the context of work in the area of inter-faith

On Sunday July 9 at 1900 the Revd Canon Kevin O Brien will be instituted in Adare. Kevin is already very much a part of this diocese, and Adare's gain will be Ennis's proverbial loss as it must now seek a new priest. Many parishes have come across Kevin through his diocesan role with Safeguarding, and his skills in communications, especially in the visual area, are almost legendary. He recently was among new appointments to the diocesan chapter.

But we gain some and we inevitably lose some. In early July we will bid farewell to the Revd Paul Fitzpatrick who moves to the diocese of Cashel Ferns and Ossory to be rector of the vibrant parish of Carlow. Paul has contributed greatly to our diocesan life in Limerick, in Killaloe and in Nenagh - holding the fort mightily in both Killaloe and Nenagh since the retirement of Dean Smyth a year ago. His passion for improving awareness of mental health issues and making Mind Matters a priority in church life is well known.

With Paul's departure and the arrival of a new rector in Nenagh, Killaloe Group will before long we hope have again its own resident priest and Dean to reside in the splendidly refurbished deanery upon completion. That person will also, with others, have a significant role to play in delivering education and training across the dioceses. Meanwhile, we are grateful to the Revd Lucy Green for her services particularly in the period of transition.

Another fine priest whom we will soon sadly lose is the Revd Bernie Daly, who came in the autumn from her home in Dublin to look after the pastoral and liturgical needs of the vacant Rathkeale Group, intending to offer us three months of her presence, but in fact enjoying it all so much that she stayed considerably longer. The time has now come to return home, but we thank her for an 'interim' ministry where she has achieved more in months than many of us could manage in years.

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The Bishop Writes

A little later in the year, and more of this anon., we will say farewell to the Revd Olive Henderson as she concludes her ministry in Clonfert, based in Banagher. In that part of the diocese she has been greatly beloved and her understanding of the concept of part time ministry has been elastic indeed. Olive and I have crossed paths in so many contexts in ministry in three dioceses over many years, and like so many I will greatly miss her friendship as she returns to Athy.

So, amid all these changes, please also keep on your hearts the need of places not already mentioned where we are seeking to identify and raise up appropriate expressions of ministry, whether stipendiary or parttime, Ordained Local, or whatever is right in the context:

- a priest colleague for Tralee/Dingle, to be based in Camp. We very much hope that we will soon be joined in this role by an American priest who knows Ireland well, but first we must deal successfully with the modern complexities of immigration matters
- New ministry in Kilcolman (Killorglin etc) when the rectory is ready for occupancy
- A new incumbent for the large Killala and Kilmoremoy (Ballina) group
- A priest colleague to be 'on the ground' in the Omey/ Clifden district of Tuam and Omey, once as we hope the deanery on Tuam has been filled

Ministry of course is not all about clergy (although where would we be without the continued generous involvement of so many of our retired priests, particularly in these days?), and the very production of this magazine, along with attention to our online platforms, is in itself an expression of ministry. So many needs of the church at times of change, already implicit

in the contents of this letter, could not be addressed without, in particular, the steadfast commitment of our Readers. In that context it was a joy to commission Rachel Kenny as a new diocesan Reader on April 30 in Ballinasloe - a number of other people are in various stages of training for such ministry and certainly two will be commissioned as Diocesan Readers in the course of the summer ... so watch this space.

One Reader whose own contribution to the pages of Newslink has been substantial and faithful for a very long time has been Mr Joc Sanders, who has compiled the monthly prayer cycle. He now wishes to hand on this task, but we thank him for a labour of love that has in itself been an expression of the man, and of his commitment to informed prayer and prayerful action as the bedrock of discipleship and a means of always lifting our eyes beyond ourselves.

Again our thanks to all concerned with this 'joint magazine' experiment and especially to the editorial teams, Ros Stevenson and Janet Bray at Newslink and Andrea Wills (in a very kind interim capacity) at Tidings all of whom work in consultation with our diocesan staff, Communications Officer and Diocesan Secretaries. In the next issue(s) I personally promise you some further reading material and initial plans concerning my late autumn scheme to visit every church in rapid succession on a hymn singing marathon to encourage awareness of and support for projects concerned with the empowerment of women through literacy in two contexts in infinitely poorer regions of the world. There will be much information to share; I am already excited and exhausted in equal measure at the very thought of it all!

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General Synod

CHURCH OF IRELAND GENERAL SYNOD WEXFORD 12TH – 16TH MAY 2023

The Church of Ireland General Synod began its 2023 meeting on Friday 12th May in Clayton White's Hotel, Wexford. Synod continued on Saturday 13th May, and then members met together online for the final evening session on Tuesday 16th May. This was the first meeting of the General Synod to be held in person since the pandemic and the first to be held in Wexford.

The primary purpose of the Synod is to enact legislation for the whole Church of Ireland. Bills, which are proposals for legislation, are considered and become Acts or Statutes if approved. Less formal proposals are submitted as motions which, if approved, become resolutions. The Synod also receives reports from various committees and boards, which are debated by the members.



















The proceedings are chaired by one of the Bishops or Archbishops and Bishop Michael Burrows took his turn chairing the discussions on some of the proceedings with efficiency and a light touch as he steered the Synod briskly through the business with a twinkle in his eye!

Each day of General Synod began with a short act of worship. A Service of Holy Communion was held on the first day in nearby St Iberius' Church, with the bishops and clergy leading a procession from the hall to the church. The preacher was Bishop Adrian Wilkinson, the bishop of Cashel, Ferns and Ossory

General Synod began at 11.00am on Friday with the Presidential Address by the Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland, the Most Revd John McDowell who recalled the themes of reconciliation and gratitude on which he chose to focus in his first

General Synod as Primate of All Ireland in 2020. The Primate drew on the example of the humility and sacrifice of Senator George Mitchell when chairing the multi–party talks which led to Northern Ireland's peace agreement in 1998. Archbishop McDowell also reflected on the meaning of being a citizen. "Part of the purpose of Christian community," he said, "is to learn to treat people as capable of civic dignity and freedom; as people capable of contributing to their nearer and wider social and political environment by free decision taken in consultation." He highlighted the modern revival of pilgrimage as an opportunity for local churches to re—engage with people who may be distant from church life but who may also be receptive to what the Church has to say.

On Saturday afternoon Lighten Our Darkness, a youth group from Mullingar Union of Parishes, earned a standing ovation from the Synod after they performed a drama to highlight the challenge of climate change. It was a presentation that looked at the stark challenges, but that offered a path of hopeful action. It was enthusiastically received by members of Synod. It marked another step in the commitment of General Synod to action in this area.

There were also fringe events carried out during the lunch breaks from synod business. One of those was a Mothers' Union a presentation by June Butler the All-Ireland President of the Mothers' Union on the theme of gender—based violence and domestic abuse and working towards its ending.

On Saturday lunchtime there was a talk from The Very Revd Maria Jansson the recently retired Dean of Waterford who spoke about how political systems and religions that feel under threat or feel their power is slipping can often create a scapegoat as an enemy figure to rally the troops. Today, in many Christian circles LGBTQI+ people are used to represent an

outside threat, a 'them' opposed to 'us', the 'outsider' who serve to define who therefore is an 'insider'. Outside the hall various organisations and charities had set up their stalls giving details of the services they offer, and it formed a relaxed venue to discuss and find out more about their work.





Closer in time, members and friends are happily invited to an All-Ireland commissioning of officers on Sunday 11th June in Armagh Cathedral at 3pm.


Mothers' Union has been highlighting the scourge of domestic abuse in this country for many years and is very happy to host two conferences in September, please see the notice.

Retreats

On Saturday 25th of February, we gathered for a retreat at Holy Hill Hermitage. A group gathered from Mayo and Sligo. They came from all various church backgrounds and none!

By request, the theme for the day was – 'Journey through the Old Testament'.



The day incorporated 4 talks along with a visual depiction of the main storyline, events and characters. There were 3 different speakers – Marian and Dylan Edwards and Keilah Joyce. Rosemonde Adamson led the musical worship along with ladies from Sligo. Others contributed to the visual arts, which formed a visual display. We enjoyed a wonderful day of Christian fellowship, laughter and joy in a truly special place – Holy Hill Hermitage at Skreen, Co. Sligo.





Another retreat was held at the home of Bert and Val Verner in Ballycastle, looking out at Downpatrick Head on Saturday 25th of March. This time the theme was – 'Crafting a Rule of Life to Stay Grounded'.

What is a 'Rule of Life'?

A rule of life was first developed by St. Benedict for monastic living. A 'rule of life' is a schedule and set of practices and relational rhythms that help us create space in our busy lives to live ordered lives. It is not a set of rules ... but a trellis on which we support our busy lives ... and looks at all aspects of ourselves and our relationships. It helps us to get our lives in balance, and makes us more intentional about what we do and how we choose to do it.

Topics which we discussed were;

Self-care Mind - Mental health, limiting device usage. Body – Healthy diet, exercise and body-image.

Rest - What practices and rhythms of rest are built into your life? A weekly Sabbath, regular sleep, morning quiet time, silence and solitude.

The Gift of Limits and Learning the Grace to say No! Relationships – What are you doing to create nurture and deepen relationships? You may need to think through the categories of relationships – family, friends, church and local community. Do you have an 'anam cara'? Who is 'community' to you? Who can your serve? Work and Money – what do we do with our time, money, resources and gifting? Generosity and how do you practice generosity?

Hospitality – When you consider hospitality, is there someone who comes to mind with whom you could practice?

Devotional Practices – Prayer, Scripture Reading, Taking a Retreat

Creative Joy – it is a deeply spiritual thing. We should seek to employ it more and more intentionally. Art, photography (Visio Divina), Gratitude Journaling, Cooking a meal ... What is your definition of creativity as a spiritual practice?

Kinship with Creation – Gardening and caring for the creation. The day was spent discussing these topics and much more!

Our next retreat will be on Saturday May 20th at the North Mayo Heritage Centre at Enniscoe. The 'star' of the show as Enniscoe House is the walled garden – so here the theme will focus on creation and the garden. God is the master artist and creator.

So on this day ... we will display art, flower arrangements, along with needlecraft and patchwork

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




Weekly Activities -


Every Tuesday evening, we gather at Marian's home. For the past few months we have enjoyed the Alpha Course.

What is ALPHA?

It is an evangelistic course which seeks to explore the basics of the Christian faith through a series of talks and discussion. It involves watching a video each week, followed by a time of discussion and reflection. We have a diverse group of people from various church backgrounds ... and Alpha beautifully holds what we have in common with other Christians ... while enabling others who are on the journey of faith. A retreat is also part of the Alpha Course.

We are beginning a new series as part of our weekly 'Gatherings'. Over the next few weeks we will explore topics such as Christian Hope, Peace (Shalom) and Purpose.

On Tuesday 25th of April, as part of panel, Marian was invited to speak at an Alpha Conference at the Star of the Sea Retreat and Conference Centre in Mullaghmore, Sligo, as a representative from Ballina Churches Together.



The aim of the conference was to explore how we can do 'mission' effectively in the West of Ireland how we can build hope and bring restoration in peoples' lives, both practically and spiritually. We also explored how we can learn from each other. Alpha Ireland are seeking to encourage church leaders and lay people who want to reach out with the gospel and learn how to do it more effectively together. It facilitates discussion around questions of faith. It deepens friendships and builds Christian community over the weeks.

On Thursday evenings, Rosemonde gathers a group at her home for bible study. On Sunday evening, we continue to gather on Zoom for the Prayer Meeting ... We are a dispersed community in a wide geographical area.

Every Wednesday and Thursday - Marian and Rose usually work together. Our work together or individually involves Pastoral Care ... to the elderly, the sick and people on the margins ... people that we know from the streets of Ballina and women from the Traveller community. Every Monday evening, Marian works with the St. Vincent de Paul in the community.

For St. Patricks Day and Easter, we distributed gift bags to children in MillView and Greenhills Estates and also to Traveller families in the town of Ballina. This ministry enables us to stay connected to families and children in the various housing estates.

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
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Loneliness, Connection, Belonging

LONELINESS, CONNECTION, BELONGING, AND CHRIST'S HEALING

Lydia writes: "I've been thinking a lot about loneliness recently. How it feels. How it steals our sense of being content in our skin. How it's not about whether we're happy in our own company or not, because we've even lost that connection to ourselves. Loneliness can make us restless, desperate to be really seen. And loneliness can make us hopeless.



It can be difficult to tackle and to connection find and belonging our because starting point is of one feeling vulnerable, and maybe unloved or unlovable. And it's difficult to address because we can feel utterly alone even when we are surrounded people. I don't think there's a single-step solution, because

the cure is found in a web of actors playing their part: for example, society as a whole and how it perceives and cares for different age groups and social groups older people and minority groups can experience the most isolation but young people ages 16 - 24 are regarded as being the most lonely.

Then there is the role of the Church family and whether or not we create cultures and create spaces where people can belong rather than fit in. A sense of needing to "fit in" causes people to pretend in order to be accepted, which is no acceptance at all. One aspect of combatting loneliness is explored in an article my colleague Catherine sent me on a recent study exploring loneliness and how it is impacted by nature connection:

"The research found that feelings of overcrowding increased loneliness by an average of 39%. But when people were able to see trees or the sky, or hear birds, feelings of loneliness fell by 28%. Feelings of social inclusion also cut loneliness by 21%, and when these feelings coincided with contact with nature the beneficial effect was boosted by a further 18%."

God is revealed in nature. Are you struggling to connect with others, or to find your tribe and feel like you belong? You are not alone. In 2019, it was estimated

that 400,000 people in Ireland were suffering as a result of Ioneliness. It might seem trite, but take one small step today, wrap up and go for a wander or a sit down in a natural space. "Lydia Monds is Ministry Leader of the Church's Ministry of Healing: Ireland (CMH:I).

CMH:I? is a Church of Ireland charity founded in 1932, and dedicated to bringing Christ's healing and wholeness to all. CMH:I is open to any and to all who need rest, retreat, quietness, and help, whether they've ever been in a church or not, whether they have firm faith or feel uncertain, and whoever they are. We offer customised training for dioceses and parishes that wish to equip lay people for prayer ministry within Services of Wholeness & Healing. This training emphasises reflective listening. It's a wonderful ministry for those who may be exploring a vocation to serve Christ, or who are involved in prayer groups, youth ministry, pastoral visits, or other ministry.

As Ministry Leader, Lydia encourages and facilitates healing ministry. Recently, she qualified as a Forest School Leader, which focuses on engaging people in nature and all the benefits that brings. Since taking on the role in January of this year, Lydia has been invited by several parishes to help facilitate events under the MindMatters Col seed funding. She organises and facilitates quiet days, retreats, healing services, prayer groups, talks, and helps parishes to set up mindful nature walks and gentle healing times outside, whether in the heart of the city or the middle of nowhere! She is currently leading a series of Lenten mini-retreats, in collaboration with the National Bible Society of Ireland, called "Under the Tree". She says: "The weather was a little cold and rainy so after we had paused to cross the threshold from our busy lives into a quiet nature space, we snuggled under a tarp with throws and hot water bottles to explore the Bible passage together. A beautiful concept that was brought out was Tov, the Hebrew word for Good, which is the word of God that goes forth and is like a seed planted in our lives. Then we walked the beautiful garden noticing sounds and sights and focusing on our breath and on the breeze. We noticed the signs of new life all around us, where seeds that have been germinating are beginning to grow." Similar nature retreats will be held later on in 2023.

"SERVICE – A PERSONAL JOURNEY

Christian faith and works are intertwined aspects of a believer's life. Faith serves as the foundation, acknowledging Jesus Christ as the source of salvation and the embodiment of God's love. However, true faith is not stagnant but manifests itself through works. Works, in this context, refer to acts of love, kindness, and service towards others, inspired by faith. In considering this I discerned a call to seek a charity that I could not only work with but broadly fitted with my own areas of interest. It's fair to say that I have a particular interest in all things tools: power or hand tools. Furthermore, I derive pleasure from repairing and refurbishing a range of things and this prompted a search for a potential charitable organisations that collect and donate unwanted tools to those who cannot afford them. Happily, in this search I came across Tools for Solidarity and subsequently spent time with them and was inspired by the great work they do:

Tools for Solidarity is a Belfast-based all Ireland charity that is dedicated to empowering communities in developing countries through the provision of tools and the promotion of sustainable development. With a mission to alleviate poverty and enhance self-reliance, Tools for Solidarity makes a significant and beneficial impact on the lives of marginalised people and communities.

The organization operates by collecting, refurbishing, and distributing donated sewing machines, tools and equipment. They operate out of a workshop in the North of Ireland which is staffed by a team of local and international volunteers with a varied age range. The volunteers are trained to painstakingly restore each tool to full functionality, ensuring they are in excellent condition before being sent to Africa and other destinations where they are distributed by partner organizations to community groups in need. By providing tools such as carpentry, blacksmithing, sewing machines and agricultural equipment, Tools for Solidarity enables individuals and communities to generate income, improve their living conditions, and gain valuable skills.

One of the key strengths of Tools for Solidarity is their emphasis on sustainability. They not only focus on providing tools but also prioritise the transfer of knowledge and skills to the recipients. Through training programs and workshops, they teach local people how to maintain, repair, and effectively use the tools, ensuring their long-term usefulness.

Moreover, the charity actively promotes environmentally friendly practices. They advocate for the reuse and recycling of tools and materials, reducing waste and promoting a circular economy. This approach not only benefits the environment but also helps communities become more self-sufficient by reducing dependence on external resources.

The impact of Tools for Solidarity's work is undeniable. By providing tools and knowledge, they facilitate individuals to become self-reliant and transform their own lives. The organization has supported numerous projects, from setting up carpentry workshops to establishing tailoring businesses, all of which have had a positive ripple effect on local economies and livelihoods.

Engaging with Tools for Solidarity also allows me to cultivate a spirit of humility and selflessness. Jesus taught us to serve others and to consider their needs above our own. Through volunteering and actively engaging in this kind of work, I can set aside my own desires and prioritise the well-being of others. It provides an opportunity to follow the example of Jesus, who came not to be served but to serve.

The approach of Tools for Solidarity fosters a sense of community and solidarity and association with this allows me to connect with people from different backgrounds, cultures, and circumstances. By working together towards a common goal of empowerment and sustainable development, we can build bridges, break down barriers, and create a more inclusive and just society.

In conclusion, I welcome the opportunity to share an aspect of my personal spiritual journey and should the work of Tools for Solidarity resonate with others I am happy to provide more details.

so say the words of the song. But it's hard to imagine that indeed we are coming into the summer season. The weather has been strange to say the least. Although some days are warm, then we get some cold weather and the rain starts again. Roll on the sunshine.. At this time of year, there are many jobs to be done as the long evenings arrive! Its bog season and the turf has been cut, so it now needs to be turned. By the time you read this, most of it will be made up if the weather is right! Its back breaking work but come next winter, it will be worth it. It's also time to plant up the garden with flowers and vegetables. A regular pastime for me. Nothing like the taste of home grown tomatoes and floury spuds!

Service of Remembrance

On Friday 24th Feb I was invited to attend a very poignant and emotional service of remembrance for all babies and children who had died over the past three years.in Mayo University Hospital. The service was led by the staff of MUH and consisted of songs and readings. The hall was packed to capacity with parents and family members and everyone had the chance to record their babies name in a book of remembrance. It truly was a beautiful night albeit highly emotional. AS we left the hall after the service everyone was given a flower to plant in remembrance of their baby.

Tenebrae

On Wednesday of holy week 5th April, we held a Tenebrae service. A very sombre occasion in which passages from scripture were read with reference to Jesus final week, ending with his burial. This service is held by candlelight and after each reading, candles are gradually extinguished, culminating with a "loud noise" taking place in total darkness at the end of the service.

As usual, I'm going to recount a lot of what happened since the last edition of the Tidings and remind you all about what you probably already know. Well, trying to write into the future is not easy you know! What I mean is the person I am writing this for (you the reader) know more than I do, and for me to pretend otherwise would be extremely foolish. As I write for instance, this summer is a tentative fledgling thing, barely begun, with an uncertain future. Whatever we might hope it will be, it may ultimately prove to be very different. It could be so much worse than we want. another dreary wet Irish summer, or it could be better than we dared hope for, it could be a real scorcher... you know a lot more about it than I do. Anyway, would that be a good thing, or an example of manifest climate change, which would ultimately be to all our detriment? That is the thing about futures, when they become the present they always seem to find a way to surprise you, they are rarely what you expected. The best we can do is look at the past and the present and try to determine from them what they are leading to next. I am writing this at a time in the church year that is between the bewildering joy of the resurrection and the compelling, interventional, energetic dynamism of Pentecost (you are reading it in what naturally follows these things, what the church calls ordinary time). Neither of these things were a future foreseen by the followers of Jesus. There were hints, and lesus said some very strange things that no one really seemed to grasp properly, though they found them strangely compelling as they found all the things he said and did compelling, but who could have imagined a future like this? Followers followed for their own reasons, the one unifying thing about them perhaps was that each was putting their trust in, and finding hope in Jesus for some kind of better future. Trust and hope delivered, but not as anyone expected. It delivered much more than they bargained for. Perhaps this is the way it always is for Christians.



It is the way to live, the place to be, it is the consequence of all that God has done for us and the reality of what God is doing for us. It is greater than what we hoped God would give us. Once you see future of course, the present can never be the same again. You start living the future. So I guess now is the time to live God's future.

St. Patrick's Day service in Killala

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




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short prayers, and also the Lifeboat Station. It was a wonderful day. Thank you to Sue Baird and Beverley Stafford for their help in organising this trip.



The attendees also broke into groups based on geographical similarities, and shared ideas that they had tried or wished to try in order to establish and develop relationships with parents and carers.


The feedback on the event was very positive, and some of the responses given regarding the 'take aways' from the session included the following comments:




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
